

Taking the theme of 'I Am' as a starting point or catalyst, the exhibition showcases a range of art works representing each artist's interpretation of I am, I wonder, I see, I want, I pretend, I cry, I feel, I worry, I say, I try, I hope and I dream using a range of mixed media and materials from drawings to paintings and art works with 3-dimensional elements.

Panel: The Immediate and Long-term Impacts of Cuts on
North Belfast's Education Sector

The panel discussion will centre around the current state of education in North Belfast, how schools are dealing with unprecedented levels of poverty, and the terrifying predictions recent cuts will have, and longer-term, on an education system already under pressure.

For centuries, The Belfast Charitable Society has been to the fore of educating the city's impoverished, providing greater opportunities for them to build a better life. This session will take a very brief look back at what education was like in the Poor House in the 18th Century before concentrating on the outcomes of following two key reports* on the education system in Northern Ireland, particularly in areas of disadvantage. (*The Consequences of the Cuts to Education for Children and Young People in Northern Ireland, and A Fair Start).

Hosted by the President of Belfast Charitable Society, Sir Ronnie Weatherup, the debate will centre on thoughts for the future, and what organisations such as the Society can do to help. Opportunities for wider input into this discussion will be made available following the event.

On this, the fifty-year anniversary of sculptor and performance artist Joseph Beuys lecturing at the former Belfast School of Art, **Robert McDowell** returns to the city for a talk and discussion on his work and the legacy he left behind.

McDowell founded the inter-disciplinary Troubled Image Group of artists (TIG) in 70's Belfast. From it came Art & Research Exchange (ARE) and other groups up to and including Bbeyond.

It included the Irish members of the Free International University founded by Joseph Beuys and Heinrich Boll. TIG presented complex often surreal truths to belie or satirise stereotyping by news media or propaganda such as that of sectarian muralists.

Director and founder of Summerhall Edinburgh, he has studied at Belfast, Slade, and Hamburg Art Schools & Cambridge University, and worked over 10 years with Beuys and 40 with Ricky Demarco.

Brian Moore was a novelist, screenwriter and son of North Belfast. He was acclaimed for the descriptions in his novels of life in Northern Ireland during and after the Second World War, in particular his explorations of the inter-communal divisions of The Troubles, and has been described as, 'one of the few genuine masters of the contemporary novel.' Writer Sharon Dempsey will lead this literary discussion of his novel. Lies of Silence (1990).

Peas Park is a community space located in the Skeogniell and Glandore area of North Belfast, situated on what once would have been considered an interface. 

Eliot Prize.

Dane Holt is a poet and editor. His pamphlet *Many Professional Wrestlers Never Retire* was published by The Lifeboat Press and was the Poetry Book Society Autumn 2023 selection.

Dawn Watson is a writer from North Belfast. Her debut poetry collection We Play Here (Granta Books) was launched in June 2023. The author of pamphlet, The Stack of Owls is Getting Higher, her work has appeared in Granta magazine, The Manchester Review, Blackbox Manifold and on BBC Radio 4.

Sailortown is an inner City Community based in Belfast Docks. It was Belfast's first waterfront village with over 5,000 people packed into the small, cobblestoned streets of terraced houses between the docks and York Street. The men worked on the docks or went to sea. The women looked after large families and found work in the mills.

Devastated by the building of the M3 Urban Motorway 50 years ago, it is slowly coming back to life. With the iconic St Joseph's Church now at its heart, it epitomises the indomitable spirit of Belfast people. Immortalised through story and song it is working towards helping to build a better future for those in the surrounding area in North Belfast

This guided walking tour by members of the Sailortown Regeneration Group will start inside St. Joseph's Church, before continuing outside to learn about the area's rich culture and heritage.

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

Dr Tara West is a Lecturer in Creative Writing at the Seamus Heaney Centre at Queen's University Belfast. Her first novel, Fodder, was published by Blackstaff Press in 2002 and her second novel, Poets Are Eaten as a Delicacy in Japan was published by Liberties Press in 2014. Her memoir of depression and recovery, The Upside of Down, was published by Dalzell Press in 2020. Tara has recently completed writing her third novel, Inventionland, due for publication in 2025.

A reminiscence of activity with Felicity McCartney on the Frederick Street Quaker Meeting site during the Troubles.

In August 1969, women and children whose homes in North- and West Belfast had been firebombed, sheltered in the meetinghouse. This was the first of a multi-level response by Quakers, in Belfast and throughout Ireland, during the Troubles. The web of connections and practical service that had been developed during the Famine, and the level of trust built up at that time, was a foundation for the response to a different crisis, a century later.

Felicity McCartney was a community worker with the Centre for Neighbourhood Development when it was based in Frederick Street Meeting's Institute building. She is co-editor of Coming From the Silence: Quaker Peacebuilding Initiatives in Northern Ireland 1969-2007 (Sessions of York, 2009).



Francis Joseph Bigger (1863-1926) was surely worthy of Roger Dixon's label – 'Ulster's Don Quixote'. From his home on Belfast's Antrim Road, surrounded by major figures of Ireland's cultural and political revival, he enthusiastically promoted all aspects of his country's Celtic heritage. We will consider the life of this Antiquarian, conservationist and author who passionately endorsed traditional festivals, literature, art and music. Dr Myrtle Hill will be in conversation with Ruth Taillon.

Dr. Myrtle Hill was formerly a Senior Lecturer and Director of the QUB's Centre for Women's Studies. She has published widely on Irish Women's, Religious and Social History. Having retired from academia, she remains active in the wider women's and community relations sectors in the North of Ireland.

Ruth Taillon was Chair of the Mary Ann McCracken Historical Society from 1992 until 2002 and a former Director of the Centre for Cross Border. The author of, When History Was Made: The Women of 1916, she is currently working on a biography of Mary Alice McNeill.

Baroness May Blood (1938 - 1922) was regarded as a community worker, trade unionist, activist for integrated education and promoter of the needs of the people. She grew up in a working-class community before leaving school early to work in the Blackstaff Linen Mill where she learned her politics and her vocation in the vanished world of the mills of Belfast, a harsh environment of long hours with many lives shortened by unsafe working conditions.

A former president of the Labour Party in Northern Ireland and involved with the Northern Ireland Women's Coalition, in 1999 she became the first woman from Northern Ireland to receive a life peerage. Involved in community work throughout her life, she was also associated with the Greater Shankill Partnership.

Joining Professor Duncan Morrow (Chair) around the table are Avila Kilmurry, Betty Carlisle and Paul Caskey who will reflect on their memories of her and the enduring legacy she has left behind.

Avila Kilmurry is director of the Community Foundation for Northern Ireland.

Betty Carlisle is Manager of the Shankill Women's Centre.

Paul Caskey, OBE, is Head of Campaign at the Integrated Education Fund.

Duncan Morrow is a Professor in Politics and Director of Community Engagement at Ulster University Belfast.






